

Parts of speech

Pronoun

“A word which is used at the place of a noun is known as pronoun such as he, she and it etc”

Basically pronoun is a word which is usually substituted for a noun.

For Example: An old *woman* brought me a very long *dress* from *a tailor*, and then she quickly disappeared.

Noun

“It is the name of a certain place, thing or a person. Like Daniel, Engdic or a lion etc.”

There are further two major types of noun **Common** noun and **Proper** noun.

For Example: An old woman brought me a very long dress from a tailor, and then she quickly disappeared.

Verb

“A verb expresses action of being, doing or having.”

There is a main verb in a sentence and sometimes one or more helping verbs. Such as (she can sing. Here sing is main verb and can is helping verb)

For Example: An old woman brought me a very long dress from a tailor, and then she quickly disappeared.

Adjective

“A word which qualifies or modifies a noun or pronoun is known as an adjective such as sweet, pretty, hot etc.”

It can also specify size, quality and the number of things.

For Example: An old woman brought me a very long dress from a tailor, and then she quickly disappeared.



Parts of speech

Adverb

“It describes or modifies a verb, an adjective or another adverb, but never a noun such as gently, quickly etc.”

They are usually used to answer the question of when, where, how. They usually ends with the word -ly.

For Example: An old woman brought me a very long dress from a tailor, and then she quickly disappeared.

Preposition

“A preposition is a word placed before a noun or pronoun to form a phrase modifying another word in the sentence such as by, with, on etc”

For Example: An old woman brought me a very long dress from a tailor, and then she quickly disappeared.

Conjunction

“Conjunctions joins words, clauses or phrases and indicates the relationship between them such as but, or so, yet are conjunctions.”

For Example: An old woman brought me a very long dress from a tailor, and then she quickly disappeared.

Interjection

“Interjections are the words used to express emotions such as Oo! Wooo! Etc.”

It is often followed by the sign of exclamation.

Oh my!

Hurrah! We won the match.
